CH188 "Increased Intercommunion": Lessons from the Lambeth Conferences Easter 2017

Description:

To paraphrase Mark Twain, reports of the death of the Anglican Communion have been greatly exaggerated. Following a tumultuous first decade in the twentieth-first century, this global family of 38 autonomous national and regional Churches somehow continues to hold together. Indeed, it might well be that one of the greatest gifts of Anglicanism to the world is the continuance of relationships, shared mission, and common prayer despite significant disagreements. The Communion is, as +Desmond Tutu once said, "messy, but very loveable."

This course explores the vital role that Lambeth Conferences have played in the life of the Communion, considering both the historical context and practical lessons of these gatherings.

Learning Outcomes:

- Articulate what it means to be Anglican in today's world.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the issues and impact of the various Conferences.
- Teach church members about the importance of the centenary of Lambeth 1920.
- Cultivate increased interest in Lambeth 2020 and show practical local implications.
