*Course Description*

Introduction to Greek Reading will build upon the language skills learned in GK10, Biblical Greek, translating selected portions of the Gospel of Mark. This class will examine related exegetical issues that arise while translating.

- To learn the syntactical and grammatical issues in the translation process.
